Oerder collection //// will cause a stir

THE EXHIBITION of historical drawings, paintings and other items from the Oerder family collection promises to make quite a stir when it opens at Gallery 101 on February 3.

HOUSE PAINTER

Frans Oerder arrived in the Transvaal from Holland in 1890 and started his painting career as a house painter with the firm of De Wijn and Engelenberg in

It is from his early years in the Transvaal that the bulk of the works on exhibition come. Oerder lived here until 1908, when he returned to Holland—to remain there for 30 years.

He returned to South Africa in 1938, only seven years before his death in June, 1945. As is the ironic way of the world, Frans Oerder, today one of the most highly regarded of South African painters, only came to be fully recognized after his death.

His oils today fetch very high prices indeed as, for instance, his study of two horses (shown above). This study is the most expensive individual work on the exhibition, being valued-at more than 1,000 guineas.
